LOMBARD TO BE BUT STONE'S THROW FROM WORLD'S LARGEST ZOO Within a few years Lombardites will not have to go to Lincoln Park or Ringling Brothers' circus to see a first-class collection of wild animals from Africa, India, and the rest of the world where they grow. They will merely take their car and drive to Riverside. Cook county voters have finally approved the bond issue for the formation of the world's greatest zoological garden which will be located near Riverside.

Work on the project will start at once, according to a contract made between the Chicago Zoological Society, Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick and the city board. It has been estimated that approximately \$5,000,000 will be spent on the project. The park will include a tract of 172 acres.

The gardens are to be completed by 1934. The contract provides that since \$1,000,000 has been expended on the zoo prior to July 1, 1925, the property shall revert to Mrs. McCormick, or her heirs shall be paid \$1,000,000. ## Re-discovering ILLINOIS

by LESTER B. COLBY  
ILLINOIS CHAPTER OF COMMERCE

Centralia once the Strawberry Center of Midwest, is Developing into an Industrial Center—Work of Picking Berries Brought Hundreds to Town in Harvest Season.

Have you ever heard of the place that is called the City of Good Times? It is a story of care-free laughter and play old-fashioned cookies with pink sugar on them of blackberry pies, molasses and children, little mothers and nobs. It's the story of a city without distraction on Halloween.

It is also a story of Centralia, one-time strawberry center of the Mid-West, once the annual Mecca for hohodom, today a city of they tell me, 14,000 people. Centralia is becoming an industrial city. The city is growing. Evolution is on the march.

Little things change destinies. I have been in Centralia several times since I started to peep the state of Illinois on these reunions. It is a sort of gateway. The city calls it the "Gateway of Egypt." Here ambitious ones have dubbed it "Queen of the Egyptian Empire."

Last spring I visited Centralia in "Apple Blossom Time." Centralia is the center of a remarkable commercial orchard district which includes pears, peaches, cranberries all autumn in springtime. In the late summer and autumn it is the headquarters for oranges and fruit marketing for all the district. I spoke of strawberries.

Back thirty years or more ago all the country about Centralia was a great strawberry patch. Hundreds of acres of strawberries year after year. Many varieties of strawberries, like the Warfield, originated here. There was work picking for everybody who might come at two cents a box. Men and women boys and girls all flocked to the fields. And that was why the boxes came.

Manufacturers leaved everything in the hobo jungles and at night time the hobo's eyes dotted the landscape like stars. These factories were kept busy making strawberry boxes and crates. Fruit boxes worked overtime printing tickets. A business developed in shipping them, that is buying blocks of tickets for cash at cut prices. People started to stand in line to cash them in.

Warms headed with strawberries lined up for four or five blocks waiting for a train at refrigerator cars. Today the strawberry business, the hobo and their journey all have vanished. (Date a memory)

With the vanishing of the strawberry industry Centralia stepped into a period of inertia. There was depression. Years of inertia they tell me. Cool finally pulled the coat of it a bit. Cool boomed as did strawberries for a time. They could count on their fingers the berries. There was a lack of hope, pessimism as I've been told, was long the curse of Centralia.

But as I've mentioned, evolution is on the march. When towns are in the dumps factories spring up. People sold into groups. There are neighborhood centers. That was true of Centralia during the periods of inertia.

Organized play has done a world of good to Centralia out of its inertia. It has eliminated the factories and has waded out the hobo. I've been interested in Centralia and its play. I've been thinking of it since apple blossom time a year ago as the great good times.

As I rode through states of bloom a gray-haired father, an aggressive and enthusiastic one—one who had worked hard and had never played—told me that.

He was just come back from an eastern university. Student days were done, his degree won. The

father pointed to him a glowing picture of his future in Centralia, a good and safe business, safe profits, active front office. But that he replied:

"Yes, if one wants to work all his days and dream of work all his days. But when and where do you play?"

Plans for the country club were canceled the next day, the gray-haired man told me prices of brick, building heavy lots, business houses and factories held less glory in his eyes. All these were good but not alluring.

Gradually the idea of play was developed. A "play expert" was employed. Organized play was started among the children. Came the organizing by children of story-telling, songs and dancing. "Balls" for parties for little mothers and their mischievous children, folk-dancing and marching under trees.

It is thought the mothers out now was that all. Soon fathers found themselves taking part in outings, while the mothers took their own pleasures. Gwentok learned that there was a high school gymnasium, the school faculty taking their own pleasures. Some pudgy, roly-poly business men, others with thinning hair and wrinkled faces, a few with double-decked chins and pudgy girls, found that they could not briskly instead of walking fast-footedly.

Finally the fact became a rum and there was buying of athletic outfits and soft-soled shoes. Boys ran to smaller sizes. Lodge, industrial groups and parent-teacher associations looked up. Increased attention was paid at church affairs. Basketball was developed. Horse shoe games were established.

Groups of young women took train courses in story-telling. School board members soon saw that the school meant better school. People began to talk of Centralia has carried organized play farther than any other city of its size in America. I am told that his has led to other organized work, that Centralia is probably the only small town in the complete organization program.

Take the case of Halloween in Centralia. Nobody ever tin over any of the usually tipplable buildings or sign of liquor or carries away wheelchairs. Halloween in Centralia is a carefully-lanterned feast, a sort of spiritual mardi gras. Everybody carries out. An average year puts 2,500 members in line. The Dumb Party had Centralia product, is a feature.

Halloween is where the blackberry and the jelly cookies come in, also the apple hobbling and the climbing of the greased pole. The greased pole and from the bonfire, a crowd of excited, quivering, happy children, help the police.

Halloween means a parade to need to row back in the days of inertia and rationalism. The city's motto is "Play or Perish."

I was joking around in the central city the other day to get the material for the lot of squabbles about the town. They took me out to the St. Clair Laundry Corp. That's a new industry. I saw the first heat pump. The new plant will work about 150 men. Little town probably 200. I was in at the heart of an industry. The plant makes heating units and commercial containers.

"I guess was in to see that first heat pump. It is building a plant in Centralia to manufacture asphalt base for brick. It is the only one of its kind in the central city. He will employ twenty men. There are other plants in Centralia. The Centralia Envelope Co. has 190 employees and makes 2,600,000 envelopes a day. The Centralia Clothing Co. 55 people makes work clothes, boys pants and knickerbockers. Other manufactured products are tents and awnings, beverages, candy, cigars, cement blocks, rubber, flour and shoes. The shoe factory works several hundred people.

The Illinois Central railroad has an investment in Centralia of shops valued at about \$5,000,000. Ordinarily about 2,000 men are employed in them. The Burlington railroad has an investment of another \$1,000,000 in shops and works around 1,000 men. Among the mineral resources of the immediate section are coal, oil, Father earth, spar, limestone and clay.

Centralia's water supply is an artificial lake four and a half miles long and with a shore line of nearly twenty-five miles. A park of forty acres, just at the city limits, is being landscaped. I asked a young business man in Centralia what he considered the most important asset of the city. He said:

"Our greatest asset has been our ability to mobilize the town's forces following depression. I've read many of these pet stories, heaps of Let's try stories. **Paving Ordinance**

(Continued from page four)  
ing shall be continuous maintained on the pavement for a period of not less than two weeks. Before final acceptance of the work and at least ten days before traffic is permitted upon the pavement, the protective covering shall be removed from the pavement. In no event shall any haulage in the concrete surface be permitted until the pavement has been changed of all earth and foreign material.

**TYPE "B"**

(Warrente-Bitullitic Pavement Upon a Concrete Base With Concrete Consolidated Curb and Gutters)  
Upon the conditions presented as herebefore provided between the lines of concrete curb and gutter of the roadway respectively above designated for their removal, and after all said curb and gutter have been constructed, and after all manholes and catchbasins lying within the limits of the roadway to be improved have been adjusted to conform to the surface of the proposed pavement, and all necessary underground work has been completed, there shall be placed a base consisting of a layer of Portland cement concrete, which said concrete base shall be uniformly six inches in thickness.

Said concrete shall be constructed from and consist of a mixture of one part of best quality Portland cement, three parts of the aggregate, five (5) parts of coarse aggregate and clean water.

Immediately before laying the concrete base the surface of the subgrade shall be wetted, but shall show no pools of water when the concrete is placed.

The cement and the aggregate shall be measured separately and then thoroughly mixed in a mechanical mixer, sufficient water being added so as to produce a concrete of a consistency that will flush mortar to the surface thereof under light tamping and which can be handled without causing a separation of the concrete aggregate from the mortar. The surface of the said layer of concrete shall be struck off to a fairly smooth surface parallel with the top surface of the pavement when completed, and to the proper height or grade receiving the remaining portion of the pavement to be placed thereon. The surface of the base of the concrete shall be parallel with and two inches below the top surface of the finished pavement.

On the foundation as specified shall be laid the Warrenite-Bitullitic Wearing Surface described below, so as to have a thickness of two inches after thorough compression. The wearing surface shall be constructed of two equalizer bituminous mixtures as hereinafter specified, the first mixture to be blended and bonded with the coarse mixture at its top, so that when completed the structure will be a compact integral mass, the lower portion being rigid and stable due to a relatively large percentage of coarse mineral particles with relative low percentage of bitumen. The upper portion being flexible and plastic due to a relatively large percentage of bitumen combined with fine mineral matter, the change from the rigid to the flexible at the lower portion

to the plasticity and malleability of the upper portion being not a sudden, but a gradual transition. The Bitullitic cement herein referred to shall consist of either a refined natural asphalt fluxed to the proper consistency as hereinafter specified, or of an asphaltic petroleum product distilled as hereinafter specified, in either instance said Bitullitic cement being composed of materials that have been in successful use as asphaltic cement in asphalt paving mixtures for a period of not less than five years.

1. When a refined natural asphalt is used the Bitullitic cement shall be made from a refined Trinidad Pitch Lake Asphaltum or Bermudez Asphaltum, or any natural Asphaltum which shall be their equal in quality for street paving purposes, fluxed with a fluxing material which may be a semi-bitullitic or an asphaltic petroleum residue which shall be tested with and found suitable for use with the natural asphalt to be used. The Bitullitic cement shall be prepared from the natural asphalt above designated in such proportions as shall produce an asphaltic cement of a penetration from 0.70 to 0.75 of a centimeter at 75 degrees Fahrenheit, the degree of penetration being such that it shall be adapted to the particular asphalt used in the paving mixture and to the traffic and other conditions of the street pavement wherein used.

2. Where an oil asphalt is used, the Bitullitic cement shall be obtained by the careful distillation of asphalt to remove until the resulting residue has a consistency such that its penetration shall vary between 0.85 and 0.95 of a centimeter at 75 degrees Fahrenheit, the degree of penetration being such that it shall be adapted to the particular asphalt used in the paving mixture and to the traffic and other conditions of the street pavement wherein used.

The Bitullitic cement as hereinabove specified under 1 and 2 shall correspond in all respects as to quality of materials, methods of sampling and methods of testing as specified respectively in specification C-1, and specification for C-2 for bituminous materials as set forth in the general specifications for road work, State of Illinois, Department of Public Works and Building, Division of Highways, edition of April, 1919.

The coarse wearing surface mixture shall be composed of mineral aggregate as described below, mixed with sufficient Bitullitic cement to thoroughly coat all of the particles and to produce a mixture containing from five to eight per cent by weight of bitumen soluble in carbon bisulphide. The mineral aggregate shall be composed of hard stone with a French coefficient of wear of at least 8 in the scale of mineral hardness and a toughness of not less than 8, or clean sound gravel, for the coarse material, combined with sand for a mixture of sand and screenings for the smaller sizes. The coarse material shall be free from soft or disintegrated stone, dirt, or other objectionable matter occurring thereon or contained on the particles. The size of the particles of the aggregate or material shall vary from the maximum (about one-half

of the thickness of the wearing surface) to the impalpable powder.

Sand used for the material shall not contain more than ten per cent of particles which will pass a two hundred mesh sieve.

If the aggregate does not contain enough finely divided particles or impalpable powder to produce the smooth top shown below, the deficiency shall be made up by the addition of limestone dust, Portland cement or other suitable fine mineral matter.

In addition to the above, the mineral aggregate shall come within the following screen test:

Passing a 3/4 in. screen and retained on a 1/2 in. screen, 20.00 per cent.  
Passing a 1/2 in. screen and retained on a No. 4 sieve, 15.25 per cent.  
Passing a No. 4 sieve and retained on a No. 10 sieve, 5.15 per cent.  
Passing a No. 10 sieve, 28.65 per cent.

The portion of the aggregate passing through the 1/2 inch screen when considered separately from the remainder of the aggregate shall meet the following screen test:

Passing a 10 mesh sieve and retained on an 8 mesh, 15.40 per cent.  
Passing a 6 mesh sieve and retained on an 4 mesh, 22.05 per cent.

Passing an 8 mesh sieve and retained on a 20 mesh, 1.60 per cent.  
Passing a 20 mesh sieve, 9.15 per cent.

The fine surfacing mixture shall be composed of mineral aggregate, described below, mechanically mixed with sufficient Bitullitic cement to thoroughly coat all of the particles and produce a uniform mixture containing ordinary eight to twelve per cent of bitumen soluble in carbon bisulphide but more shall be used if necessary to make the surface compact after ultimate compression.

The mineral aggregate shall consist of sand or a combination of sand and crusher screenings, and shall be not larger than one-quarter inch in diameter, except on grades where a coarse aggregate may be used.

That portion of the aggregate passing through the 1/8 inch screen when considered separately from the remainder of the aggregate shall meet the screen test specified for the fine aggregate of the coarse wearing surface mixture.

The ingredients shall be heated to such a temperature between the limits of 200 and 250 degrees Fahrenheit that when the mixtures are delivered on the work they shall be in a sufficiently plastic condition for spreading and rolling (which will vary with the temperature of the aggregate) but shall not be heated to a sufficient high temperature to injure the Bitullitic cement.

Either of the two following methods and apparatus shall be used in the preparation of the wearing surface:  
1. The mineral aggregate shall be heated in a rotary drier, and while still hot, separated into at least four sizes by means of a rotary screen having a minimum screen opening of about one-half inch and a maximum opening of about one and one-fourth inch. The openings in the successive screen sections up to one-half inch shall not vary more than one-fourth of an inch and not more than three-

fourths of an inch for the sizes larger than one-half inch.

The effective screening area of each screen section shall be at least twenty square feet, and the screens shall be so arranged that the material which passes through one screen section shall not pass through any portion of the next larger mesh screen.

The mineral aggregate thus separated shall pass into a bin having sections or compartments corresponding to the size and the heat-dropped into a capacity of all the compartments to be not less than two cubic yards. From these several compartments the aggregate shall be drawn into a weigh box, resting on a multi-bowl scale, and the correct amount of aggregate from each of the above compartments shall be accurately weighed separately on the scale and the bin dropped into a "Win Pig" mixer, where it shall be intimately associated and thoroughly commingled with a pre-determined quantity of separately heated Bitullitic cement sufficient to coat all particles of the aggregate. The mixing shall be continued until the combination is a uniform bituminous concrete.

The several grades and sizes of the mineral aggregate as delivered at the mixing plant shall be kept in separate piles. The amount of mineral aggregate required for a batch shall then be accurately measured up in the proper proportions of the several sizes to give the best results and the same shall be fed into an elevator terminating in a hopper or bin which discharges into a rotary drier or heater, both hopper and heater being so designed as to keep each batch by itself until thoroughly dried and heated. From the rotary heater a batch of mineral aggregate shall pass into a mixer containing bitullitic cement and other devices for producing a uniform mixture of the mineral aggregate with a pre-determined quantity of the separately heated Bitullitic cement sufficient to coat all the particles of the aggregate.

The mixing shall be continued until the combination is a uniform bituminous concrete.

The coarse wearing surface mixture shall be spread upon the prepared concrete base by means of a broom or fork, and raked to a uniform surface and to such a depth that after the fine surfacing mixture has been spread and rolled the completed

wearing surface shall have the thickness hereinbefore specified.

While the above coarse mixture is still in a malleable condition and before it has been compacted in any manner which will prevent the even blending and bonding of the finer material with the coarse mixture at the top of the mass, it shall be covered with the "Fine Surfacing Mixture" at the rate of thirty to fifty pounds per square yard, and more shall be added to any area where required to cause the surface to seal or close up.

Immediately after spreading the "Fine Surfacing Mixture" as described above, the pavement shall be thoroughly compressed by use of a ten to twelve ton, three wheel, self-propelled roller. The rolling shall be continued until no roller marks appear. Places inac-

cessible to the roller shall be thoroughly tamped by hand to the satisfaction of the Board of Local Improvements.

Warren Brothers Company, owners of the patents used in the construction of the Warrenite-Bitullitic pavement, of the Village of Lombard, Illinois, which is about to receive bids for the construction of a properly executed bidding agreement to furnish to any contractor desiring to bid for the work, all the necessary Warren-Bitullitic surface mixtures, mixed ready for use, in accordance with section "Wearing Surfaces," at a definite reasonable price. Said price shall include a license to use all of the patents required in the construction of the Warrenite-Bitullitic pavement as herein specified.

The acceptance of bids by the Board of Local Improvements of the Village of Lombard, Illinois, and the letting of a contract for the same shall be deemed by Warren Brothers Company to be an acceptance of its proposal by the said Board of Local Improvements and by the contractor to whom such contract shall be awarded and are all that shall be necessary to bind Warren Brothers Company to said agreement. The filing of a bid under those specifications will be construed as an acceptance of the terms of the license agreement filed by Warren Brothers Company, at the price fixed in said agreement, which shall be on file with the said Board of Local Improvements.


