OCTOBER JURY RETURNS LIST OF INDICTMENTS

Indicts and lists were returned by the grand jury before Circuit Judge Wm. G. Knott on the morning of October 20. The grand jury returned 19 indictments, charged two of them being against Charles Crider of Bartlett and Herman Bond of Downers Grove for the alleged beating and kidnapping of Winsor Waggoner of Naperville on October 16.

One bill charged that the two indicted men "beat up" Waggoner, charging them with assault with deadly weapons, namely hands and fists. The other alleged kidnapping is an effort to obtain a promise from Waggoner that union men under his jurisdiction would drop certain jobs on which they were working. Bonds were set at \$4,500.

Waggoner is business agent for the Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers union, local 74, an independent organization.

Other Indictments

Other indictments follow: John and Charles Seever of Aurora, larceny, involving theft of three buffers stolen from John Eberick of Elmhurst. Bonds set at \$2,000.

Stanley Johnson of Chicago, larceny of automobile and tampering with an automobile. Avon E. Eberly, Chicago, manslaughter. His truck struck and killed Francis Simpson of Joliet on October 20.

F. D. Robinson, Glen Ellyn, embezzlement. Charles Schellenberg, alias Jack Mulford, Villa Park, rape. In county jail under bonds of \$5,000.

The jury was dismissed for the term, subject to recall.

County Farm He-Men Like To "Rough It" Sans Rugs on Floors

Men inmates of the DuPage county farm want to know that they are not to be considered "sanes." They are still he-men, no matter their age or condition. This fact was made known in a report made by James Caruthers of Glen Ellyn, a member of the public welfare committee, to the board of supervisors.

The report shows that the women's rooms in the county farm building have been redecorated with soft, pleasing colors. The old dilapidated shades replaced with new ones to give a more feminine appearance. Rugs also have been placed on the floor of the women's rooms. It was explained that the rugs were placed on the women's rooms so that the women would not have to step on the cold boards. A member of the board of supervisors asked Mr. Caruthers if rugs had not been supplied for the men's rooms but he replied that the men had told the committee they did not need them, and did not want them.
